It is my hope that the intentionality and organization of this strategy will result in sufficient funding for needed programs and LCA families feeling less overwhelmed in that pursuit.

Social Media Policy

The internet has developed into a vital tool in our society. Our kids will never remember a time when they couldn't access all manner of information on the nearest "smart" device. Our ability to communicate freely, quickly and often is taken for granted. We all feel that sense of frustration when our search takes more than a few seconds to materialize.

As is always the case, with great advancement there is also the opportunity for negative influences to enter our lives just as freely, quickly and often. We have to create safeguards to protect our children from these negative influences. It involves setting policies and practices that are healthy and promote a healthy environment. The world of social media is constantly changing and we all need to go the extra measure to ensure we stay ahead of the influences that would seek to harm or hurt our children.

In the same way, we at LCA, must develop appropriate safeguards to protect our students, our faculty, staff and coaches. For this reason we have developed a Social Media Policy for our employees. The purpose of these polices is to protect our students, our employees and our school.

After reviewing numerous policies utilized by other schools around the country, as well as assessing the needs of our own school, the administrative team has constructed a set of policies that we expect our staff to follow. By the same token we would ask our LCA families to cooperate with the new policy standards as well. The main emphasis of this policy relates to how adults will interact on social media with our students. Additionally, some of the policies are

designed to protect you as families from having personal information put on the web.

How will this look in real terms?

- Teachers will no longer "follow" current students on social media platforms. After the student graduates they may choose to do so at that time.
- Teachers will not allow students to "follow" the teacher's personal social media sites.
- We are asking our staff not to "tag" any LCA students in photographs other than their own children. If a student wants to be identified they may choose to tag their own photo.

Implementing a policy such as this comes with many questions and challenges as we begin to live this out. If you have any questions please give me call and I will be happy to discussing this change with you.

As you may know, the theme we have chosen for this school year comes from John 15:4-5

Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit by itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in me. I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing.

Abide is not a word we commonly make part of our regular conversation. Outside of a Biblical context, I cannot remember the last time I phrased something using that word. What does it mean to **Abide**? As you look at various translations the word **Remain** is often used... *Remain in me and I in you...* You will also see the concept of continuing, or persevering.

As we read the passage, we tend to get fixated on *our* responsibility to abide. It is important that we don't miss the larger picture... **Christ abides in us!** He stays, remains, continues, perseveres, in us! Do you get the significance of that... the God of the universe, over all time, space and power... He remains in us! And because of that abiding, we can bear fruit. Without it... we can do nothing.

So what is fruit bearing? I think the first place to start is to ask what God has called you to do. Are you married? Then He has called you to be a faithful husband or wife. Do you have children (probably so if you are reading this), then he has called you to be a loving, teaching, committed parent.

Galatians 5 lists the fruit of the Holy Spirit, who ABIDES IN US! These are qualities that we are only capable of demonstrating because the Spirit of God remains in us.

Recently I have become more aware than ever that we are raising children in a world that doesn't seem to value respect. Between tweets and texts, music and movies that focus on sarcasm, name calling, and crass, demeaning humor, we have lost the value of showing deference to one another and to

those in authority over us. This behavior isn't limited to children and teenagers. All too often we adults demonstrate to our young people just how disparaging we can be. When we don't like what the leadership is doing (either in government, church, or here at school) our tongues can tear them down in a matter of seconds.

The Bible calls us to be kind, to obey those in authority, to use words to encourage... to be **respectful** of others. It is one way to demonstrate our Abiding in the Vine. As a parent, and grandparent I know how easy it is to allow unkind, disrespectful words to slip into our own conversations, and that of our kids. Let me encourage you to call your children to a higher standard. Expect them to show respect toward you and your spouse. Don't allow an unfit word or tone of voice to be commonplace in your relationships both inside and outside your home. Set the example to your children of showing kindness, gentleness and self-control in your dealings with people.

It is my intent to offer a monthly encouragement to various ways each of us can demonstrate our position in Christ... Abiding in the Vine! I hope you will take up the challenge!
