LEGACY CHRISTIAN ACADEMY: Look at what God has done!

In 1966, Emmanuel Baptist Church completed the expansion of an education wing to the existing structure. The pastor, John Teeters, had dreamed of making the building one which could be used all week and not just on Sundays. Miss Carla Packard agreed to help and started the first preschool and first kindergarten class in the fall of 1967.

Consider some of the following tidbits and allow these to jog your memory of many other happenings. Think about the teachers, the things you learned, the friendships and the culture that was created through the years.



- 1967** Mrs. Carol Osborn was the first kindergarten teacher. XCDS was born! Mike Mikesell was a student and to this day (2018) is still helping Ken Kettering with lights!
- 1968** XCDS continued its ministry by adding AM and PM preschools and kindergartens and 1st grade which was taught by Miss Anna Titus.
- 1969** God continued to bless our school and 2nd grade was added to the school, taught by Miss Diane Chaffee.
- 1970** Mrs. Lois Killian became principal for one year. Third grade was added and Mrs. Patricia Dunstan was the teacher. Mrs. Sandra Whetstone and Mrs. Esther Massey taught the AM preschool class and Mrs. Hazel Sproul with Esther Massey's assistance taught the PM class.
- 1971** Mr. Donald Higdon was called to be the new principal, and he also taught the 4th-5th combined class. Miss Diane Cockerill became the new kindergarten teacher. Pastor John Teeters moved on and Interim Pastor Dr. James Greer took over.
- 1972** XCDS continued growing and added 6th grade. Mrs. Patricia Dunstan returned to teach the 5th-6th grade combined class. Dr. William Wheeler was installed as the new pastor of Emmanuel Baptist Church.
- 1973** God blessed us with enough 5th and 6th graders to split that combined class and Mrs. Patricia Dunstan stayed in 5th grade and Mrs. Susan St. Denis was hired to teach the 6th grade.

DAR essay winner, Scott Van Zant, a 5th grader, won the local contest and the state contest.

1974 This year, XCDS received Ohio certification for the elementary school. The enrollment for K-6 was 117 plus 16 preschoolers.

April 1974 - Xenia was struck by a monstrous tornado, destroying many homes and businesses and killing 34 people. The church/school was not touched by the actual storm, but the hearts of those involved in the school were touched by 15 families from EBC losing their homes and the deaths of one of our 1st graders, William Armstrong, and his mother. The Ruth West family initiated The William Kent Armstrong Scholarship Fund in her grandson's name, and it continues today for members of Emmanuel Baptist Church.

1975 The XCDS enrollment K-6 was 151 plus 6 preschoolers. The board decided to start junior high.

1976 Seventh grade was not added because only 3 students had committed to enroll. Mrs. Susan Hancock taught first grade, Miss Melody Fry taught 2nd and Miss Karen Rost was installed as the 3rd grade teacher.

1977 Miss Debbie Conrad (now Mrs. Cody) became the 1st grade teacher.

1979 Mrs. Lois Killian took over the task of teaching kindergarten.

1980 XCDS used the individualized Alpha and Omega program. Grades 6th through 10th were put together with 27 students. Mrs. Patricia Dunstan was the facilitator of this part of the school.



1981 There were 17 students in 7th-8th and 20 students 9th-12th grades with the enrollment of several students transferring from Dayton Christian (the rivalry is just getting started). Most of these students were from the Xenia school district. Mrs. Patricia Dunstan became the acting principal of the High School in October.

Cedarville College hosted the National History Day, April 18, 1981, which involved schools from across the state. Eighth grader, Ruth Margraff wrote the play "The Deceiver," which centered on the deception young farm girls faced in the early 1800s. Those participating in the play were: Ruth and Paul Margraff, Tami Terrill and Margaret Wheeler. They received a Superior Rating which placed them in State competition. While there, they attended a Cleveland Indians game where Len Barker pitched a perfect game. The students also traveled to Washington, D.C. for the National Competition.

May 10, 1981, Emmanuel Baptist Church voted to have XCDS become part of the ministry of EBC. This was to legally protect the school.



- 1981** Mr. Doug Terrill and Mr. Dick Bresson coached our new basketball teams.
- 1982** First graduating class (there is a story here) - Chad Bresson, Tammy Eimers, Stephen Kreamer, Jim Phillips, and Angela Sparkman.
- 1983** Mr. Donald Dunstan was hired as headmaster of the middle school (22 students) and high school (28 students). With K-6 at 132 students the program was up to 182 students. Miss Sherry Godsey hired as fourth grade teacher. The second graduating class included students that had started in Kindergarten 1970-71 were: Cynthia Baise, Gary Phillips, Jeffery Shepherd, and Nadine Terrill.
- 1983** Still growing - K-6th=141; 7th-8th=37 and 9th-12th=35 students for a total of 213.
- 1984** K-6th=131; 7th-8th=24; 9th-12th=39 for a total of 194 students. The 1984 graduating class went to Washington D.C. for their senior trip. Graduating were Beth Augustine, Brad Bresson, John Hart, and Michele Moody.
- Mrs. Lois Killian moved to fourth grade.
- 1985** Nine students graduated. They were: Tod Bowen, Kelli Bradds, Janie Bresson, Kim Eimers, Richard Fields, Terri Huber, William Shepherd, Tami Terrill, Clark Wiedenheft.
- 1986** Mr. George Hawkins became the principal of XCDS and XCHS. XCHS changed to a traditional curriculum. Mr. Dick Kaercher came to teach math and science. Mrs. Pat Dunstan returned to 6th grade.
- 1987** 20th year as a school. Eighth grader, Erin Killian won the DAR essay contest in Xenia and went on to win the state. Nadine Terrill taught 7th and 8th grade. The play *I Never Saw Another Butterfly* was put on by the high school.
- 1988** Mr. Charles Wilkins became the principal of the school. Van Holloway began his teaching career at the high school. Mrs. Debi House began teaching third grade.

1989 Christa Preston, won the DAR essay contest in Xenia and the state competition.

1990 Our girls' volleyball team won the ACSI state. Men's basketball team and the women's basketball teams each won the state championship in ACSI.

Librarian Mrs. Kay Pauley passes away.

1992 XCDS celebrated its 25th Anniversary.

Hard times and tension was high, but Dayton Christian Schools took over management of XCDS in the spring and the school became known as Dayton Christian, Xenia Campus (DC-XC). Tennis started.

1993 Mr. Robert Colaner became principal of the school. Mrs. Debbie Conrad Cody returned to first grade, and Marylou Preston took over at second grade.

1994 The old roller rink on Lower Bellbrook became available to house the high school. Swim team began. Mission trips under Mrs. Jan Soloman began.

1995 The Roller Rink is renovated and XCHS moved in. The internationally known speaker and political activist, Calvin Thomas, spoke at the installation of the new building.

1996 Mr. Alan Stock moved from asst. principal of DCHS to become the new principal of XCHS. Mr. Robert Colaner continued as principal of the elementary school and also taught music. Tailgate parties began.



1997 First Play in the roller rink - *Our Miss Brooks*

1998 The OVCH campus in Xenia became available and DC bought the entire campus for \$1.8 million (you have to hear these stories!).

1999 XCE and XCHS moved onto this campus, and it became known as the Legacy campus. The volunteer work crews were without match! ISP, Heart to Honduras, Joni and Friends, AIA all moved to campus.

2000 Mr. Colaner continued as principal of elementary and music teacher while Mrs. Pat Dunstan became assistant principal.

2001 Mr. Alan Geist took over as principal of the high school. Jennifer McKeller went to state in the two-mile. Girls soccer began. And Tornado #2! Who can forget the hero of 2001 who gave his life for the students to take a day off school – the squirrel who got into the electric box – we will never forget you!!

2002 Mr. Colaner went back to full-time music and Mrs. Pat Dunstan took over as full-time principal of the elementary. The triplets took the girls basketball team to the State Final Four – what a season that was!!

2003 Dr. Roy Lowrie became the second superintendent of Dayton Christian Schools and 3 days after his installation he was diagnosed with cancer that would eventually take his life in May of 2006.

Boys' 4-by-4 won the State (Stephen Dye, Bobby Komisariski, Thomas Raper, Joseph Green) and Bobby Komisariski also won the 300 low hurdles. Jimmy Whalen and Daniel Urshel went to the International Science Fair.

2004 Mr. Jerry Martin, Mrs. Natalie Demana, Mrs. Michele Patterson, and Mrs. Patricia Dunstan procured desks and tables from Springfield Public school auction to meet furniture needs.

2005 Mr. Lee Reno (long-term right-hand-man to Mr. Schindler) was named superintendent of DCSS and served in this capacity through 2010. Alan Stock returned as principal of XCHS. AIA opened their first-class turf stadiums.

2006 Golf started. The RUGBY crew got started. Anyone remember what this stands for?

2007 Boys shaved their heads to join Dr. Grabill in support as he fought cancer. Largest graduating class – 62 students.

2008 Mrs. Natalie Demana became principal of the elementary school. Dr. Grabill passed away in the spring.

2010 Leader, Fundraiser, giver, friend, Dad, and Grandpa, Mr. Jerry Armstrong passed away. Economic downturn was very difficult.



2011 Significant grant received, tunnels sealed and several buildings torn down. Asbestos abated. Josh McDowell spoke to the kids. What an amazing landscaping team Carol Frueh and Deb Cozenza put together year after year!



2012 Dayton Christian Schools celebrated its 50th Anniversary with a terrific concert by Michael W. Smith at Cedarville University. Tailgate party reached a whole new level – thanks Mr. Harr! First trip to Costa Rica. Mrs. Lois Killian earned the ACSI Career Service and Achievement Award.

2013 Dancing is now allowed – on Mr. Batchelor’s watch! Dr. Dan Bragg became principal of XCHS in the fall.



2014 Discussions began about the future of XCS and what it would look like to be independent. Enrollment sunk to 300 students after peaking in 2004 at 550 students. Tragic loss of Mrs. Michele Patterson, Kindergarten teacher in December.



2015 Talks with DC continued, and they approved a plan to allow XC to become independent. Fundraising began.

Grace Norman participated in the state track and cross country events, placing in the top 8, and later became a Paralympic gold and bronze medalist. Keep paying attention to her as she continues to excel and thrive and compete for Cedarville University.

Cross Country girls team went to State.

XC held their first fundraising banquet at the Schindler Banquet Center and 400 people attended, raising right at \$290,000. It was a great success as God’s people continued to work and pray together raising right at \$750,000 in the first year.

Board Incorporated – Brad Riddle – President, Mark Combs – Vice President, Chris McCaskey – Treasurer, Brett Stanley – Secretary, Marc Sweeney – Development, Kevin Wichman – Fundraising. Have you ever heard of risk-taking???

2016 This was a banner year as Xenia Christian transitioned to Legacy Christian Academy and was led by Dr. Dan Bragg. Go Knights! Enrollment at 365. Banquet #2 showed the impressive nature of the volunteer staff and the willingness of the LCA community to work together and get things done. Special speaker was comedian Jason Earls. Eric Knowles won State – twice and this made five times, not to mention a swim in the Olympic Trials! Tommy Hoskins won State (again) while his teammates Wyatt Riddle took runner-up and AJ Warner took fourth – first-year wrestling team got 6th in the entire state with three guys! Bowling inaugural season.

2017 Another tragedy as Colleen Reilly, 2011 grad and current photographer and part-time custodian dies suddenly.

Enrollment grew to 412 students. Legacy Christian Academy marks the 50th year of Xenia Christian Day School; Dayton Christian, Xenia Campus; Legacy Christian Academy! We praise the Lord for sustaining this school for His glory and may it continue to hold high the Word of God. Just look at what God has done!

Hall of Fame Honoree **PATRICIA BIRD DUNSTAN**



I grew up on a farm in Saline, Michigan, and attended the Saline public schools, graduating from Saline High School in 1962. I was raised in a Christian family, and we all attended York Baptist Church in Milan, Michigan, regularly. I was taught the Word of God at home and at church and accepted Christ as my personal savior when I was eight years old. My parents, Karl and Dorothy Bird, set an example of Christlikeness and prayed for me every day and even made Xenia Christian a priority in their prayer lives.

After graduation from high school, I attended Cedarville College, graduating in 1966 with a major in Christian education. Two weeks after graduation, Don Dunstan and I were married, and we settled in Xenia, where we planned to stay for one year. I served as secretary for the Army ROTC at Central State University from 1966 to 1970 while taking education classes at Central State to complete my Ohio teaching certification. Our daughter, Sandy, was born in 1970, and I was very pregnant while I was doing my student teaching in Yellow Springs. Will, our son, was born in 1975. We are blessed with five grandchildren.

My history with Xenia Christian started when we joined Emmanuel Baptist in 1967 and Don and I joined the Xenia Christian Day School Corporation. I was hired to teach third grade for the 1970-1971 school year, and for the most part I was a part of Xenia Christian until I retired in 2008. In 1972-73 I taught combined fifth and sixth grade, 1973 to 1976 fifth grade only, and 1976 to 1980 sixth grade only. In the fall of 1980 we started the Alpha and Omega curriculum, and I was the resource teacher for grades six through ten in an individualized program. The first class graduated in 1982, and I still served as resource teacher as well as acting principal of the high school. In 1982 my husband, Don, came as headmaster of the high school, and the Alpha and Omega curriculum continued until 1985. In the fall of 1985 I returned to the classroom and taught sixth grade until 2000. From 2000 to 2002 I served as assistant elementary principal, and from 2002 until I retired in 2008 as elementary principal.

God has been faithful to me all these years and has blessed me time and time again by bringing just the right leaders into my life at just the right time. Over these past 50 years it has been my privilege to watch Xenia Christian grow from those early years of adding one new grade each year to Legacy Christian Academy, an academic and spiritual leader in the community, the entire area, and even to the regions beyond. "Now to Him who is able to do exceedingly abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that works in us, to Him be glory in the church (our school) by Christ Jesus to all generations, forever and ever. Amen" (Ephesians 3: 20 and 21).

Jim Preston had a front row seat as a board member during the school's transition from Emmanuel Baptist Church to the alliance with Dayton Christian. He says, "We were so thankful and appreciative for the way Dayton Christian stepped in."

Although Jim has had helpers and assistants over the years, he has been the constant coach of cross country and track every year since the program was started in 1993. "The reason I started the program was because my girls were not any good at volleyball!!" How many times have we heard over the years "Coach Preston was like a Dad to me"?

When asked what is his favorite memory, he replied, "Too many to tell", but there were two that stood out:

Bobby KomisarSKI ran a 48-second quarter to win the 4-by-4 at the state meet in 2003!

Or how about when he looked at Robin Norman and said, "That little girl is going to be famous!" He was talking about Paralympic Gold Medalist Grace Norman.

Jim is a fun, no-nonsense guy, but remembers the time he was checking out the elementary field day and got in trouble by Principal Dunstan for letting Casey Surls run with the big kids. Though a little embarrassed, he knew he made the right call as Casey won the race anyhow!

Jim has nothing but praise to the Lord and considers his life – his work, wife Marylou, girls Christa and Claire, all of it – an absolute joy. He has been living the good life for 70 years and sees no reason to stop now!

Hall of Fame Honoree **ROBERT COLANER**



Prior to teaching music full-time at Legacy Christian Academy and Xenia Christian School, Mr. Colaner was the administrator hired in 1993 by Bud Schindler to lead the annexation of the Xenia Christian School campus when it became part of Dayton Christian. He remained principal there for nine years, while continuing to teach some music classes.

Mr. Colaner has been a music educator for over 40 years, having started out as a public school music teacher. His elementary music classes perform two cantatas each year, including much original material. Currently he directs all of the choral and orchestral string ensembles in grades 5-12 at Legacy Christian Academy, but over the years has done everything pertaining to music. Choral and/or orchestral ensembles that he has prepared are accustomed to receiving "superior" ratings each year at Ohio Music Education Association (OMEA) Adjudicated Events.

Mr. Colaner is married to Barbara (41 years), and has three grown and married children and seven grandchildren. Mrs. Colaner taught for 7 years at Xenia Christian and currently is office manager at Emmanuel Baptist Church: all their children graduated from Xenia Christian. 
